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AWEE ABAYARI: What started you to write books about war stories?

JAY WERTZ: I was originally concentrating on producing a documentary film about D-Day. But when I started interviewing veterans and became aware of a number of veterans, from different forces and different theaters of war, I realized the wealth of information I could get from talking to them was so much greater than one battle or campaign. I knew I had to do a comprehensive book series on the entire war to make use of the many dynamic and interesting interviews I have done, which now number close to 1,000.

AWEE ABAYARI: Is there anyone in your family who fought in WWII ? What did they do? JAY WERTZ: My father was a gunnery instructor, a tech sergeant, who did not serve outside the United States. I have an uncle who was a B-24 co-pilot, shot down and killed over France. Several other uncles served but I'm not sure of their roles. My mother was also a "Rosie the Riveter" making bomb parts.

AWEE ABAYARI: You are an author of six books, what made you achieve two award-winning war stories?

JAY WERTZ: The wealth of material derived from interviews with veterans and eyewitnesses, combined with solid research and retelling of the latest scholarly writings on the war. Excellent maps and dramatic photos well designed into a quality printed work. AWEE ABAYARI: What kind of research did you have to undertake?

JAY WERTZ: I read the classic works of each period along with more contemporary writings in books and magazines to get the latest word on what really happened.

AWEE ABAYARI: How long did it take you to write the two works that talk about the "26th Cavalry, Philippine Scouts: The Pacific - Volume One - Pearl Harbor to Guadalcanal" and "Pearl Harbor and the Day of Infamy." a comic book ?

JAY WERTZ: The Pacific - Volume One was a year from beginning the outline to the publication date. For the comic book it was five months.

AWEE ABAYARI: What motivated you to write a comic book? Tell us more about it and explain the title, 'They Called Themselves the Battling Bastards of Bataan' ?

JAY WERTZ: The idea of the comic books, the first, Pearl Harbor and the Day of Infamy, and the one I am writing now, They Call Themselves the Battling Bastards of Bataan, is to use a type of publication which many younger readers (school age and young adults) relate to and use the format to tell real history with real heroes in place of the fictional superheroes on which many comic books are based. The title of the new comic book comes from a name a unit of the Philippine Scouts used to describe themselves while fighting the Japanese in early 1942 and was adopted by the Americans and Filipinos desperately fighting the Japanese on Bataan, unsupported by the U.S. government at the time. The idea of using the phrase "The Battling Bastards of Bataan" was suggested to me by a member of the Philippine Scouts Heritage Society.

AWEE ABAYARI: Is this an easier read and will encourage more people to take interest in reading books about war history? Why?

JAY WERTZ: It is an easier read and we hope the graphic illustrations and concise narration will attract readers who are not ready to take on an academic history, or even a well-written but involved popular history of the war or one of the actions in it. We hope the comic book will inspire them later to read more on the part or parts of the story that interests them.

AWEE ABAYARI: What type of challenges do you generally encounter in writing your books? JAY WERTZ: The challenge in writing is to get every detail correct, make the work error free in content and design. The challenge once the book is finished in finding distribution channels and booksellers that realize that people desire access to important works of history and other non-fiction; and not just a few of the latest best sellers.

AWEE ABAYARI: What war stories do you remember most when you interviewed the Filipino World War II veterans and why?

JAY WERTZ: There are so many. Obviously the last cavalry charge at Barong was a very important one. The desperation of the last days on Bataan before the surrender. The mistreatment of POWs in the hands of the Japanese. The dangers of being discovered while operating as a guerrilla. Why? These are great stories of human character and also firsthand combat experiences. AWEE ABAYARI: How difficult is it to get veterans to tell you their personal stories about the war? JAY WERTZ: I have been fortunate enough to only be turned down for interviews about a dozen times. Most veterans realize it's now or never to get their personal war stories chronicled. Occasionally, some have difficulties with their memories but I can usually steer them to a dramatic event or encounter which they have more vivid recollections of.

AWEE ABAYARI: Of all the veterans you have interviewed, who will you remember most for the rest of your life and why?

JAY WERTZ: I can remember all of them to some degree and always will. I have a hundred great movie scripts rolling around in my head from these individuals actual wartime experiences. I could give dozens of examples if you have the time.

AWEE ABAYARI: What would you want people to know about World War II?

JAY WERTZ: That millions sacrificed everything they had including often their lives to save the world from the control of evil forces wishing to dehumanize all they defeated. Without the historic outcome of World War II the world would have devolved into a segregated culture of militarily strong controlling entities and zombie-like enslaved peoples. And that if we don't learn what happened and why, the world will fall prey to the same dominating forces in the future. AWEE ABAYARI: What is your opinion about the war?

JAY WERTZ: "War is hell and you cannot refine it." -- American Civil War General William T. Sherman. I agree. It is something no one should have to endure yet until people settle their differences in more humane ways it will always be with us. It is important to study the most concentrated aspect of the human condition, that is war, to understand human nature and to try to avoid situations that result in wars.

AWEE ABAYARI: Who do you admire most among the military and political leaders that you have interviewed and why?

JAY WERTZ: That's a difficult question to answer because there are so many and so many different reasons why. I will say the U.S. President I most admire is Abraham Lincoln because he remained true to his ideals but was also the most skilled politician and knew how to use politics and the military to better the country and its people.

AWEE ABAYARI: Have you interviewed Col. Ed Ramsey? What do you remember most about him? JAY WERTZ: I did. What I remember most was how engaging his personality was and how he took to me immediately without any particular reason -- just accepted me as an eager student of what I could learn from him. I think this is something that everyone who knew him after the war probably encountered. That lack of judgment and bitterness toward people is unusual for someone who went through what he did.

AWEE ABAYARI: What for you is the role of the Philippines and Filipino units and individuals in World War II?

JAY WERTZ: They were fighters for freedom entirely loyal to the Allies (except for the Huks) against a shared enemy. They fought the invasion, they fought as guerrillas and they fought to the end on the side of the American soldiers and even beyond as independent units bringing in the Japanese who refused to surrender.

AWEE ABAYARI: What is your message to the Filipino World War II veterans? Do you think they have received the recognition they deserve?

JAY WERTZ: That they were invaluable partners to freedom, to be proud of their contributions and to understand that patience is necessary until the world realizes their contributions. The history of their fight had been overlooked for too long. But historians and historical writers are beginning to overcome that ignorance on the part of Americans and those in other cultures. Recognition like the Congressional gold medal is very late, but it is coming.

AWEE ABAYARI: What makes you proud about the books that you have written and how did it change your life?

JAY WERTZ: I'm proud that I can leave behind historic works that touch people and bring great stories to readers in highly communicative ways. Not only have I met some of the finest people anyone could know in the process of writing and finishing the books, I have realized the best contribution I can make to those in current and future generations.

AWEE ABAYARI: What do you expect people to learn from reading your books and how will it impact their lives?

JAY WERTZ: I expect people to get a greater understanding of what war means on an individual level, to those who have experienced it and have lived through it. With the big picture content of my works, I hope that people will go further, to other primary sources and well-made books, other writing styles and even audio-visual presentations, in their quest for the most complete knowledge in what interests them.

AWEE ABAYARI: Where are your books available?

JAY WERTZ: The exclusive Southern California source for my books is Philippine Expression Bookshop, San Pedro. They can also be purchased online from Amazon, America in WWII magazine's online store, WorldWarllComix.com and fine museum bookstores such as that at the National WWII Museum, New Orleans.
